Fun with Rhyme!

Learning how to manipulate words through rhyming and rhyming word games is an important reading skill. Rhyming lends itself to better phonological awareness; the ability to break words into smaller parts and recognize smaller parts in words.

Try these ideas to help your child practise rhyming!



Incy Wincy Spider

Try reading rhyming stories and pausing at the end of a sentence for your child to provide the rhyming word

Sing songs and nursery rhymes together. Ask your child what their favourite rhymes are, or the library often has books of nursery rhymes



Have fun making up playful rhymes with familiar words, for example "Dinner tonight is *wasta, lasta... PASTA!*" "Time for school *cade, bade...JADE!*"
See if your child can complete the sentence!
