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## 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1. At Buckingham Park Church of England Primary School it is important that every member of the school community feels valued and respected, and that each person is treated fairly and well. # 2. INTENT

At Buckingham Park we aim to provide a consistent, progressive and clear journey of learning by delivering lessons that are not only engaging and fun but lessons that inspire children to explore a diverse range of music and to be able to express themselves musically. Music is for all and at Buckingham Park we aim for every child to leave KS2, a musician. They will do this by making sustained progress regardless of their starting points, ability or background.

#### Our aims of the teaching of Music are:

- To introduce a broad repertoire of music from Western Classical Tradition, to the best popular music and music from around the world.
- For the children to be involved in whole-school singing, ensemble playing, experimenting with the creative process and, developing the love of listening to friends and fellow pupils, performing.
- To learn rhythmic and melodic instruments in KS1 and KS2. This could be through individual lessons or through whole-class teaching.
- To learn staff notation that will complement developing aural skills, improvisation, memorisation and composition.
- For skills to be expressed instrumentally, vocally or through music technology.

### Special Educational Needs Disability (SEND)/Pupil Premium/Higher attainers:

- Set high expectations for every pupil, whatever their prior attainment.
- Lessons that are planned to address potential areas of difficulty and to remove barriers to pupil • achievement.

#### 4. IMPACT

In order to truly appreciate the intended vision for our curriculum, you must come in, to immerse and experience this for yourselves.

Assessment for learning is fundamental to raising standards and enabling children to reach their potential. Assessment in Music will take place throughout a unit using a range of strategies such as verbal feedback for

performance and verbal feedback during discussions. Regularly recording performances throughout a unit enables us to evaluate the progress our children make. Watching back through these performances allows the children to critique their own skills and how these can be improved in future lessons. At the end of the year an assessment will be completed which reviews the whole years' academic objectives.

The subject leader's role is to empower colleagues to teach Music to a high standard using the Charanga Scheme. The subject leader will also support staff in the following ways:

- By keeping up-to-date with the current issues e.g. The New Model Music Curriculum.
- Leading by example by modelling lessons or styles of teaching
- Having knowledge of the quality of music provision across the school and using this to provide a coaching and mentoring role.
- Identifying and acting on the development needs of staff
- Monitoring expectations, provision and attainment across the school and providing feedback to develop practice further in order to raise standards
- Providing necessary equipment and maintaining it to a high standard
